Analysis of Student Work

Analysis of students' classroom work allows teachers to modify their instruction to support understanding.

Strategic Questioning Strategies

Use with individuals, small groups, or whole class and ask students thoughtful, higher-order questions. These questions require more in-depth thinking from students and helps teachers to discern the level and extent of the students' understanding.

Think-Pair-Share

Teacher asks a question that relates to a lesson goal and students write their answers. Then students are placed in pairs to discuss their responses. Teacher can gain insight based on individual's understanding while walking around and listening to the pairs.

Exit/Admit Tickets

Exit tickets help to understand if students' interpretation of the lesson is accurate. The information will help to plan a whole- or small-group or small- group lesson to reteach the concept. Admit tickets are completed to kick off the class, and students respond to a question about homework or a lesson from the day before.

One-Minute Papers

Students, either in groups or individually, are asked to answer a brief question in writing. The responses are analyzed to gain awareness of students' understanding.
